Course Description

This course emphasizes the social behaviour and cognitions of the individual in social context. Central topics dealt with from this perspective include social perception and impression formation; attitudes, beliefs, and values; prejudice and discrimination; and the formation and function of the social self. Other relevant topics include sex and gender roles and differences; moral judgment; social development, and social psychology applied to health, law, and justice. Theories and methodology relevant to this orientation and these topics will be examined. Requisite Courses: PSYC-1000 [prerequisite(s)].

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course you will:

- Be familiar with both classic and new research in social psychology
- Understand the core methods and theories of social psychology
- Be able to assess social issues from the perspective of social psychology
- Be able to identify problems and limitations in psychological research
- Have enhanced your critical thinking skills

Evaluation

Your grade in this course will be based on **three tests** and your **participation** in class. Tests will include both multiple choice and short answer questions. Please bring photo identification to all tests. No outside aids or equipment are permitted during tests.

Participation in this course will be assessed through regular **exit tickets**. Tickets will be handed out at the start of class and students are asked to complete and return the ticket before *exiting* the class based on a prompt from the instructor. All exit tickets are weighted equally in your total participation score and are marked pass/fail. Students may miss up to two exit tickets without penalty. This and other course work does not need to be text processed.
