Course Description: This course emphasizes social behaviour and cognitions of the individual in social context. Central topics covered from this perspective include social perception and impression formation; attitudes, beliefs, and values; prejudice and discrimination; and the formation and function of the social self. Other relevant topics include sex and gender roles and differences; judgment and decision-making; and social development. Theories and methodology relevant to this orientation and these topics will be examined.

Format of Tests:

- Tests may consist of a combination of multiple choice and written answer questions.

- Test #3 will cover material from chapters 6 and 12 as well as lecture/assigned material.

Group Discussions:

Over the term there will be at least six group discussions; however you will only be marked on five of them (one mark per group discussion will be allotted for a total of five percent of your total mark). In small groups you will be asked to discuss an aspect of the class material and share your thoughts on the material discussed. The five points allocated for group discussion will be based on participation in the discussion. You must be in class *and* participate in the discussion to receive full group discussion marks.

Medical documentation must include: the date you were examined, a clear statement indicating that due to the severity of the illness you were unable to write the exam on the scheduled date, and the signature of the doctor. There are no exceptions to this policy.
